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Ireland v Surrey

Castle Avenue 5th/6th May 2004

A wondrous win which will enter the legends of Irish cricket in future ages. But it was not a legend it was a fact.

Despite the array of stars Ireland chased 262 and won, with 10 balls and five wickets to spare and despite needing a run a ball from 15 overs out. A number of phases of this match can be highlighted wherein lay Ireland's win. The first was the removal of Brown (67 off 49 balls) at 91 by means of a marvellous catch by Morgan at long on in the 18th over. Their 155 for three in 30 overs looked like o a score of 300 plus was on the cards. After 40 overs this was still on at 217 for five but less likely. McCallan and White had taken a wicket each and went on to take five between them. With McCallan finished Botha came back and took the last three wickets in three overs for nine runs. So the last 10 overs saw Surrey lose five wickets for only 44 runs a massive turning point.

The next phase leading to the Irish win was when Jason Molins (58) and Jeremy Bray (52) put Surrey's opening bowlers, Bicknell and Ormond to the sword taking 77 runs off their 12 overs and scored 103 in all in 20.3 overs. Then Gerald Dros scored 45 off 53 balls and Peter Gillespie 28 off 31. The fifth wicket fell at 223 with 39 needed off 43 balls. Kyle McCallan joined Andrew White who had faced just four balls. For many the next 33 balls were the best feature of Ireland's win. These two saw the match out in fine style against the pace bowlers. They hit five fours in the process and White plundered 13 runs off the 47th over to leave two runs in two overs to be scored.

A wide and a single to fine leg by McCallan saw Ireland home in one of the most famous victories in Ireland's 580th match. The Press rewarded Andrew White as Man-of-the-Match.

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Ireland v Northamptonshire

Castle Avenue, Dublin Sunday May 30th, 2004

The dream provoked in the previous round by the wondrous defeat of Surrey was shattered 21 days later by a win for Northamptonshire. Put into batlreland made a respectable score of 263 but, aggressive batting from Martin Van Jaarsveld (93n.o) and David Sales (49) saw Ireland conceded this score with no less than 49 balls to spare.

Ireland started briskly. Jason Molins hit both opening bowlers for fours in their first overs, but then 3 wickets fell and Peter Gillespie (66) then joined Jeremy Bray (76) in what became the highest stand of the Match by either side. Despite two long breaks for rain they put on 115 runs in 28 overs.

Ireland used six bowlers. Only Andre Botha took wickets, three for 51 in his 10 overs. Van Jaarsveld's 93 not out from 81 balls rightly won him the Man-of-the-Match Award.

So Ireland's massive 10 match sequence of victories was at an end.

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Ireland v West Indies

Bank of Ireland International Stormont, Belfast Wednesday June 16th, 2004

In the first Bank of Ireland International the West Indies won the toss and elected to bat. Ireland started well and had the West Indies at 40-3, with Adrian McCoubrey taking two wickets (2-26). At this stage Brian Lara came to the wicket.

This was the 4th match Lara had played against Ireland - but the first time he got beyond single figures. He made up for that in style scoring his 106 from 99 balls with 4 6's and 12 4's. There had been a huge appeal for LBW against him 2nd ball and before he got into double figures there was also a loud appeal for a catch at the wicket, both however turned down.

The West Indies were bowled out for 242 in the 47th over, with 139 of these coming from Lara and Dwayne Bravo, for the fifth wicket. Andre Botha was the pick of the Irish bowlers taking 3-42

Ireland got off to a brisk start reaching 30 after 5 overs. However, they then began to lose wickets quickly and were never really in contention

thereafter. Jeremy Bray was out for less than 50 for the first time in 5 matches (21) and the only other main contributors in Ireland's 146 all out, being Andre Botha, 21 and Kyle McCallan 32.

Gordon Cooke's return to the Irish side did not last that very long. Firstly his son was hit on the head by a six hit by Brian Lara. Then shortly after that Cooke himself seemed to go over on his ankle and after a 10/15 minute delay while he was treated on the pitch he was brought to an ambulance - where his son was already being treated! It had been feared that Cooke had broken his ankle but it subsequently transpired he had damaged ligaments. He was unable to bat in the Irish innings.





Ireland v West Indies

Bank of Ireland International Stormont, Belfast Thursday, June 17th 2004

The second Bank of Ireland International was delayed by 45 minutes due to rain and once again the West Indies won the toss and elected to bat. Whereas the first match was very much one for the bowlers this game saw the batsmen take centre stage and Ireland claiming another historic victory over a Test Nation by 6 wickets

Dwayne Bravo followed up his 45 with a 100 not out. The hundred was brought up in style with a 6 off the last ball of the innings. Ridley Jacobs on his return to Northern Ireland scored 40 and Devon Smith 42 as the West Indies amassed 292 for 7 in their 50 overs. John Mooney took 3-67 and Trent Johnston 2 for 29.

Ireland got off to an explosive start with openers Jason Molins, 66, and Jeremy Bray, 71, dispatching the bowling to all parts of the ground in a partnership of 111. The team consolidated and progressed towards the target of 293 which they reached in the 47th over. Niall O'Brien guided the way with 58 not out, in partnerships with Peter Gillespie, 25, and Andrew White 32 not out.

Niall O'Brien was voted the Bank of Ireland Man of the Match.

Ireland v M.C.C at Limavady

Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday June 29th, 30th, July 1st 2004

This three day match was in preparation for the ICC's new Intercontinental cup competition and saw three players make their debut. Greg Thompson took over Eoin Morgan's record as the youngest ever player to be capped for Ireland, less than one year after Morgan had achieved that record. Thompson was 16 years and 286 days (58 days younger than Morgan). Gary Kidd and Naseer Shoukat.

Ireland won the toss and elected to bat and Jeremy Bray and his new opening partner Dominick Joyce got the team off to the perfect start with an opening partnership of 151. Jeremy's 116 was his second hundred for Ireland while Dominick contributed 56. Ireland declared their first innings at 321-7 and bowled MCC out for 275. Naseer Shoukat made the perfect start to his international career when he removed Jason Ratcliffe with his fourth ball.

Ireland started their second innings with the aim of setting the MCC a tempting target. Once again Dominick Joyce scored a half century and with Trent Johnston scoring his first half century for Ireland the stand in captain Kyle McCallan declared at 196 for 3. This left the MCC needing 243 in their second innings off a minimum of 58 overs. This they achieved in the 44th over thanks to Asif Mujtaba's unbeaten 117 and M Foster's 80.

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Ireland v Holland at Deventer

Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday July 13th, 14th, 15th 2004

Ireland began the Intercontinental cup with a trip to Deventer to play Holland, who had just returned from Edinburgh where they drew with Scotland.

Ireland won the toss and put Holland into bat and soon the bowlers were on top taking wickets on a regular basis and bowling them out for 200 in 80 overs. Trent Johnston and Kyle McCallan were the pick of the attack with 4-34 and 2-6.

In reply Ireland scored 388-8 declared thanks mainly to Andrew Whites excellent 152 not out and Trent Johnston's 60. White's hundred was his second century for Ireland and his highest score. The lead was 188 and as it proved more than enough as Holland were bowled out for 141 in their second innings to give Ireland an Innings and 47 run victory.

The main architect in the Dutch collapse was Naseer Shoukat who claimed his first five wicket haul, 5-30, with support of captain Kyle McCallan who claimed a further 3 wickets.

The victory saw Ireland top the European group with 30 points and the only team with a victory.

Batting first Ireland reached 181 - 9 in their 31 overs with Andrew White and Trent Johnston top scoring with 40 and 49.

Holland lost two early wickets but a third wicket partnership of 86 kept them in the hunt for victory. However, Trent Johnston and the fit again Gordon Cooke turned the game Ireland's way taking 5 wickets between them and restricting Holland to 171-8 at the close of the innings.

Ireland v Scotland at Deventer, Holland

Wednesday, July 21st 2004

This was the game that Ireland needed to win if they were to become the leading associate nation in Europe. The match was a close affair as was expected but the Irish claimed a 5 wicket victory in the 47th over.

Scotland batted first reaching 200 for 6, with Andrew White returning excellent figures of 3 for 38 off 9 overs. In reply Jason Molins and Jeremy Bray again posted a half century opening partnership, 81, but three quick wickets brought the Scots back into it.

Andrew White, 43, and Peter Gillespie, 32, swung the game back to Ireland and eventual victory, Irelands second in 16 matches against Scotland.


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Ireland v Denmark at Utrecht, Holland

Thursday, July 22nd 2004

Ireland batted first in this their final match of the tournament and their innings was dominated by two partnerships. The first being 65 for the second wicket between Jason Molins and Andre Botha and the second, 140 for the fifth wicket between Trent Johnston, 83, and Kyle McCallan, 64 not out.

This left Denmark needing 266 to win off their 50 overs but they never mounted a serious challenge and completed their innings at 156 for 9 giving Ireland a 109 run victory.

The spin twins of McCallan and White kept Denmark well behind the run rate and ended with figures of 2 - 35 and 3 - 34 respectively.

There were two final games to be played the next day and results saw Ireland finish top of the 4 Associate Nations and ranked 1 in Europe for the ICC Trophy 2005.

Player of the year - Andrew White



The winner of the Irish Cricketer of the Year 2004 reflects on a year which contained some outstanding performances by the Irish team, in particular with two great wins over Surrey in the Cheltenham & Gloucester Trophy and over West Indies in a match which saw Ireland chase 292 in 50 Overs and win comfortably with more than 4 overs to spare.

Our winner played a significant part in both of those wins, and also in other matches during the year. In the win over Surrey he was declared the Man-of-the-Match with 3 for 43 and 20 not out. He followed this with another fine partnership in the match against Northamptonshire, scoring 44, unfortunately not resulting in a win this time. When it came to the West Indies win he was yet again involved in the final partnership that won the game, this time scoring 32 not out.

This was not enough for him and in Ireland's match against Holland in the new Intercontinental Cup trophy he scored a magnificent 152* which was a very significant factor in Ireland's win by an Innings. This was his first class debut for Ireland. He then went on to contribute to Ireland's fine performance in the European Championships in Holland, which led to Ireland being the top European Seeds for the forthcoming ICC Trophy to be held in Ireland in 2005. In 2004 he scored 440 runs at

an average of just under 50 and took 14 wickets at just over 30.

In his 53 matches to date for Ireland he has scored just under 1,250 runs at an average of just over 30 and taken 50 wickets at an average of 27.5.

On a personal level his outstanding performances led to his being offered a contract to play for Northamptonshire, a contract which included a commitment that he would be made available for the ICC Trophy.

He has also performed magnificently in domestic cricket initially with North Down and then subsequently with Instonians where he won a number of matches off his own bat.

Speaking after receiving the award, Andrew said, "it is a huge honour to receive the award after what was a very special year for Irish cricket. Looking back on the year brings a great sense of pride and satisfaction and although I am getting used to finishing games off, the work of all the players in the big games was superb. The great partnerships in the two big games made life easier for me at the end. It was tremendous for the Sunday Independent and Hyundai to recognise the efforts of the Ireland team over the past number of years and I hope they will be involved for years to come."

Without going into detail, the Irish scorecards did improve as the series went on and by the Sunday match in Merrion CC, Ireland had closed the gap to sub 100 runs, which was an improvement on previous perforamances.

We learnt much about running hard between the wickets and bowling a consistent line and length which was purpose of the exercise and, in order to redress the balance of hemispheres, much is required to close the gap. As a sport competing for national lottery funding, future sponsorship and media attention, perhaps the more tricky task is to attract players from other sports to provide the depth of players within the womens' game. In my opinion, this challenge is equal to raising our profile locally and to and compete regularly at world class standard when we have limited support from government and industry.

Whilst staying positive and objective in the main, we continue to strive for success and, with the goodwill of various ICU mens coaching and administrative staff, we work in earnest towards World Cup 2005 in South Africa.

Coach's View – Peter Johnston

This summer the Irish Women's team competed in the Men's Leinster Junior A League with much greater success, winning more games than we lost. It appears the psychological battle of playing against guys has been won and the girls now have much more belief in their ability. These games are valuable for the squad and give the players the opportunity to face faster bowling and stronger hitters. It also provides us with the chance of rotating the squad and giving everyone an equal chance of selection for capped matches. We then showed steady improvement throughout the season with International games against New Zealand and an ECB Development XI.

The sponsorship from Bosch Domestic Appliances gave these games a professional feel with new one day kit provided and personal achievement awards given in each game. In terms of young players coming through, Jill Whelan and Jill Smythe both made significant strides, while Eimear Richardson also stated a claim and will definitely be a strong All Rounder of the future. The Joyce twins continued to impress also, along with the experienced Miriam Grealey and opening bowler Barbara McDonald. Unfortunately we would lose Isobel Joyce, potentially our best bat from our World Cup Squad, due to academic commitments. Clare Shillington would continue to lead the side from the front as Captain.

After qualifying as winners of the IWCC Trophy 2 seasons previous, our final preparation phase began in October 2004 with a Training Camp held in Methodist College Belfast. The weekend included Fitness work and Assessment, Nets and a variety of lectures on Nutrition, Sport Psychology, Tactics and conditions in South Africa. Guests on the weekend included Ruth Wood Martin, Tadhg McIntyre, Jonathan Bush, Mat Dwyer, John Wills and Adi Birrell. The Camp was enjoyed by everyone and the girls left pretty tired but knowing they had put the work in.

Training then commenced on a weekly basis, on Sunday mornings at North County with the squad of 18, which was then reduced to 14 in January. As you can imagine the hall was freezing and the girls endured some tough bleep tests in arctic conditions and many a ball stinging their cold hands. Following the Camp, I had managed to gain the support of Adi Birrell and Mat Dwyer to assist in coaching the girls. Andrew McCarter a Sports Therapist then joined us after Christmas and helped with Core Strength work and Stretching. Optional Saturday sessions also took place in the New Year and this was followed by 3 compulsory training weekends before we left for SA. The squad worked hard on all aspects of their game during these sessions and met up once per week for fitness work. We used plenty of open nets to simulate match conditions at various stages of the game. Mat's son came down to bowl along with a few other guys, in order to get the girls feet moving against faster bowling.

By the time the 11th of March 2005 came, we felt very well prepared but knew that some serious catch up work was needed to get familiar with conditions outside when we would get to our new home, The High Performance Centre at Tuk's University. The standard of fielding and fitness had improved hugely over the Winter. Our goals were clear and attainable, we wanted to finish in the top 6 of the tournament in order to qualify for the next World Cup. We have targeted games against South Africa, Sri Lanka and the West Indies as opportunities to pick up points.





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Irish Women's Cricket Team -Goals Heading Into World Cup 2005

In October the Irish Women's World Cup training squad headed to Methodist Collage Belfast, to among other things, set out a plan that would take us up to and beyond South Africa in March. With the help of our coaching staff, manager and sports physiologist we put together a mission statement that became the spearhead of our training sessions.

"The Irish Senior Women's squad are a united group of individuals who's mission is, to work effectively together to play at our best consistently in order to peak at the World Cup 2005"

From this plan we set out specific goals which we felt were realistic and achievable with the funds, facilities and schedules available to us. Without doubt, our most important and focused upon goal has been to insure that we automatically qualify for the next World Cup in Australia in 2009. The World Cup is the biggest stage in which Lady cricketers can compete. It is of huge importance that Irish cricket can compete and maintain it's position at this level.

In order for Ireland to automatically qualify for the next World Cup we must finish within the top six. This World Cup sees the introduction of a points system in which both winning and loosing teams will be able to accumulate bonus points. Therefore, qualification will mean winning a minimum of two games.

We have singled out Sri Lanka and the West Indies as our teams to beat. Sri Lanka narrowly beat us in World Cup 2000 in New Zealand and we have not played them since. However, their results against teams such as Pakistan and the West Indies in recent years suggests that they are well within our reach. As with Sri Lanka, we have not played the West Indies since the ICC Trophy in Holland in 2003. There we narrowly beat them and feel we can play even better this time round.

As a unit we have also set ourselves goals above and beyond the number six spot. Cricket is a funny game, and although we realize that beating the likes of Australia, New Zealand and England would take considerable amounts of Irish Luck, wins against South Africa and India are not completely out of our grasp.

Our final, and to me our most important goal, is to return home from South Africa knowing we couldn't have trained, prepared and played any harder, leaving no stone unturned. Experiencing a World Cup is an amazing opportunity and I have every confidence that we can compete and achieve our standards and goals in South Africa 2005.

Eoin Morgan has become the first winner from the world of cricket of the Irish Examiner Junior Sports Award. The young Middlesex all rounder was

a deserved winner of the accolade, and follows in the very famous footsteps of such notables as Roy Keane and Damien Duff, previous recipients of the award.

He was deligthed to have received the honour and told CricketIreland, " Naturally I was very proud to accept the Irish Examiner Junior Sports Star Award for cricket, not only because of all the great sports stars who have received it before me like Damien Duff and Roy Keane, but because I was the first to receive it for cricket in the 21 year history of the awards. Everyone was treated like superstars and it made me feel very special indeed."

So how did the Irish international feel that 2004 went for him? "Personally, it wasn't a very successful 2004 for me, although winning the school's Senior Cup, and being part of both strong Irish Senior and Under 19 teams, I didn't think I played that well. However, one of the positives to take out of last year were my performances with Middlesex, scoring over 300 runs at an average of 47. Playing for my school, CUS is always very special to me, as they have given me so much support and encouragement since I started there. My 404 runs at an average of 101, and 16 wickets helped us to be successful in the Leinster Schools Cup Final which was a little payback."

Eoin has just been given a 3 year contract with Middlesex and is looking forward to the coming season, " I've got on well at Middlesex and I've thoroughly enjoyed my time there. With my signing a 3 year full time contract, I'm delighted to have the opportunity to play cricket at such a high level. I'm extremely happy there and the coaching I receive is second to none. I'm looking forward to the coming season, where I hope to remain injury free, be chosen for the Middlesex first XI, and hopefully lead CUS to as successful a campaign as last year."

Youth Cricket, 2004: Retrospect and Prospect

The endeavours of the Youth section of the Irish Cricket Union are underpinned by two objectives, increasing involvement in cricket and promoting excellence. The inextricable links between the two main objectives have resulted in the concept of a close season becoming more of an anachronism each year. The extensive programme of winter and spring coaching which is co-ordinated by the ICU complements the excellent coaching programmes which are in place in the constituent cricket unions. Additionally, many of our young players are furthering their cricketing education by going to Australia, to schools in South Africa or to the South African Cricket Academy.

The fruits of all this labour are evidenced by the successes of our teams at the various international events of the past year. Our under 13, under 15 and under 19 teams won their tournaments, and three of our players, Shane Getkate, Neil Hamilton and Gary Wilson, were honoured with player of the tournament awards. The under 17 ECC tournament was hosted superbly by the North West Cricket Union, but for the second year in a row, our players were defeated at this level by Scotland. We owe a huge debt of gratitude to all of our managers and coaches for their selfless commitment and generosity, and in particular we thank Gary Blair who stepped down at the end of the tournament after a number of very successful seasons as manager of the u15 team.

At inter-provincial level, the u13 tournament was staged in Belfast, and a very strong Leinster team was victorious. The u15 team tournament was held in Dublin, with the NCU emerging as the overall winners. Noteworthy at each of these tournaments was the very high level of skill and enthusiasm of the players, and the fantastic support which cricket receives from the families of the players and from the clubs which host tournament games so willingly.

The All-Ireland Club Tournament Finals have developed into great sporting occasions with visiting teams bringing lots of supporters, and the home clubs going to great lengths to entertain their visitors with very lavish hospitality. The under 15 final was won by Clontarf who defeated a very competitive Ballymena side. The under 13 and under 11 finals were contested by Instonians and Malahide, with Instonians winning at under 11, and Malahide winning at under 13. The inclusion of teams from the North West will add another dimension to these tournaments during the 2005 season.

In terms of prestige and consequences, the European under 19 tournament in Dundee in late July is most important event at youth level in the coming season because success will mean qualification for the under 19 World Cup. Our squad will contain some of the players who competed so successfully in the previous World Cup in Sri Lanka, and if there are no major problems with regard to the availability of players who have received

county contracts in England, we should acquit ourselves very well. Our under 17 team will be travelling to Denmark, our under 15s to Holland, and the under 13 tournament is being hosted in Dublin. If our players replicate the feats of recent years, it will be tremendous, but it is far more important that we continue to monitor and to coach our young cricketers so that they are given every opportunity to excel. Tentative steps have been taken with regard to the establishment of Academytype structures in the NCU and in the LCU, and it is to be hoped that eventually we will be in a position to enlist the services of coaches for the month of August so that the work can be done on the strengths and weaknesses which were identified during the international tournaments.

The National Coach, Adrian Birrell, has shown a tremendous interest in our young cricketers, and he has been instrumental in developing the concept of a Team Ireland whereby all of our teams from under 13 to Senior level play to a common strategy. He has shown by his imaginative selection policies a willingness to promote young players to the Senior Team. The time is now opportune to avail of the raised awareness which will accrue from the hosting of the ICC Trophy, to seek out sponsorship which will enable our young cricketers to continue in the pursuit of excellence and to fulfil their all of their cricketing ambitions and aspirations.

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Obituaries

Ian Lewis

Former Ireland cricket international and well-known administrator Ian Lewis died suddenly at his home in Dublin in November at the age of 69.

A member of YMCA Cricket Club in Dublin, Lewis was one of the leading batsmen in the country throughout a playing career that spanned 36 seasons. In that time, he played 357 senior matches for YMCA, amassing more than 8,500 runs and eight centuries. He also played for some years with Cork County CC at the Mardyke when his work took him to Munster. He made his international debut against the MCC at Lord's in 1955 and won what turned out to be the last of his 20 caps against Canada in Toronto in 1973. He also played 44 times for South Leinster at interprovincial level, scoring 1,127 runs at an average of 32.20.

Perhaps the highlight of his international career came in College Park in 1963 against a formidable West Indies team that included the likes of Charlie Griffiths and Conrad Hunte. Lewis scored 41 out of Ireland's low total of 62, an innings that included two big sixes off legendary Jamaican left-arm spinner Alf Valentine.

In recent years, Lewis turned his talents and dedication to the administrative side of the game in Ireland, representing YMCA on the Leinster Cricket Union for many years. He was made president of the LCU in 1982, a position he held for two years, and in 1989 he was elected as president of the Irish Cricket Union. He continued to support the game long after retiring as a player and followed the national side on many tours and tournaments as far away as Malaysia, Zimbabwe and Kenya. His son, Alan, is Ireland's most capped cricketer and currently an international rugby referee. Indeed, when his father took ill on Saturday, Alan was in Hampden Park taking charge of the Scotland versus Australia Test.

In October 2004, Lewis's enormous contribution to Irish cricket, both on and off the field, was recognised at the annual dinner of the LCU when he was inducted into Leinster's Hall of Fame.

Lewis is survived by his wife, Ida, son Alan and daughter Nicola. He will also be sadly missed by his many friends at YMCA Cricket Club, Wanderers RFC, the Hibernian Catch Club, Carrickmines Golf Club and will be remembered with fondness at cricket grounds all over Ireland and beyond.

Cecil Cave

A life-long member of Holywood Cricket Club and President of the Irish Cricket Union in 1976.

As president of the ICU, Cecil received a delegation from the Cricket Council which saw Ireland enter a new era in cricket.

Cecil is survived by his wife and three children.

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Chief Executive's Statement

Introduction

The continued success of our International teams is encouraging, pleasing and one which makes us all proud.

Through this the profile of cricket in Ireland and around the World continues to increase. This is no more reflected than when we are taking to government agencies, companies, both large and small, and they are fully aware of the sport and our achievements.

This makes any presentation easier, as more time is now spent on selling the commercial opportunities which exist within the sport and how they can assist the company in achieving their business objectives.

As I mentioned this time last year the Union would be facing challenges and one of these was commercial income. On the whole we have met this challenge through the securing of 4 new sponsors for Irish cricket, making this stream of revenue the largest amount received since 2001 which included the Australian match.

These companies have been mentioned by the Hon. Secretary but I would like to personally thank them and that it has been a pleasure working with them and helping them maximise their sponsorship.

The way forward

As the success, of our teams, continue we are faced with new financial challenges. Therefore our off field activities have to be and are reviewed, amended to create new and unique opportunities to assist our commercial, self help and grant securing activities.

It is the commercial and self help areas where we are looking to become even more pro-active.

However, this is not to say we are ignoring the sources of Grant income, as the excellent news from the Irish Sports Council for 2005 proves.

a) Sponsorship

The success of 2004 is being built upon and more discussions, proposals and presentations are being held with potential partners. In fact the next few weeks will see me travelling the country to, hopefully, conclude deals with 3 major companies.

Sponsorship is changing. Long gone are the days where a cheque was handed over in return for a couple of advertising boards and lunch, but we would still accept this.

Companies are looking for a commercial return for their £ or \in . We are listening to this and through access to databases, publications, the teams and high profile matches cricket is certainly becoming a viable option.

b) Ticketing

The active promotion of selling advanced tickets to Irish matches has been successful and one which will continue for the foreseeable future. With over 5,000 people attending the Bank of Ireland Internationals in June we now have a database of known cricket followers.

This will be a valuable asset to the Union and will be marketed with information on Membership, C&G & ICC Trophy matches, hospitality and merchandise.

c) Merchandising

On merchandising we have now completed one year of offering replica and leisure clothing. Thanks must be given to Lion Sports and Signature Sports (our kit sponsor) in moving this element forward.

The signs are encouraging and it was rewarding to see so many adults and children at the matches wearing replica shirts. The range is to be expanded this summer and will include Official ICC Trophy clothing. Partnerships are being discussed with major cricket websites to promote the clothing world wide.

d) Membership

With 2005 being a momentous year for Irish Cricket an intensive recruitment campaign will occur. For the first time there will be a glossy application form produced which will be used for direct mailings, inclusion in any correspondence from the office and enquiries

In addition a new category has been created - Junior Membership. With the assistance of the cricket development officers and access to coaching courses we now have a product to bring in the youth element to the Irish Cricket Union.

e) Hospitality

Last year an official hospitality agency was appointed to sell packages at the West Indies matches and there was interest.

We will be building upon this and making hospitality packages a key element at the

Irish matches this summer.

To assist in this and promoting other services to companies, lists of the companies across Ireland are being obtained and will be actively targeted.

Selp-help

Whilst the commercial market is one where the focus will intensify the self help projects, the golf days, will continue to become regular activities. The organisers have already been thanked but I would like to add my appreciation for their hard work and excellent results.

These activities are being planned as we speak and dates announced shortly but we have a project in operation now. We have a Women's World Cup raffle with 6 monthly draws to win at least €250 and a Bosch appliance.

The February draw will take place after the AGM and if you have not got a ticket or tickets yet, don't worry I have a small number left for sale - so see me at the end.

I would like to add my own best wishes to the Irish Women's Team team which heads off to South Africa on 11th March for the World Cup and we hope bring the women back a few Test Nation scalps!


ICC TROPHY / C&G 2006

We are fortunate to have two major cricket competitions on which to focus:

- the ICC Trophy this summer and
- the new format of the C&G Trophy in 2006, with 9 matches against English Counties, at least 4 in Ireland.

Added to this is the drive, focus and commitment of the Officers, Committee and Chief Executive to see Irish cricket prosper both on and off the pitch, which leads me to end with this statement:

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Hon. Secretary's Annual Report 2004

2004

While not matching the 10 wins of 2003, this was still a historic year with wins against West Indies and Surrey, our first win against a county in the Cheltenham and Gloucester, an excellent performance in the European Championships, winning three games and only losing on a bowl out against England. The one blot was our disappointing defeat by Scotland, the eventual winners of the Tournament, in the ICC Intercontinental Cup. Our Under 19s performed with great credit in Bangladesh and won the European Under 19s. Our Under 15s and Under 13s were also victorious in their European Championships. Our Senior Women had three satisfactory games against the World Champions, New Zealand, while the Under 21s were only beaten by England in their European Championships.

Off the field, while not the record loss of 2003, the loss of \in 30,000 is nevertheless very worrying and with a further loss of \in 50,000 in our Grant from ECB in 2005, we have plenty to be concerned about on the financial side.

The year started in Bangladesh, when a very talented Under 19s participated in the World Cup. There has already been a report in last year's Annual but I would like to put on record an extract from the report of the ICC Development Team to the ICC Development Committee:

"Ireland

Arguably the best Associate side of the tournament with victories over PNG, Uganda and Canada. They fell six runs short of a memorable defeat of the West Indies (eventual finalists) in the round robin stage, and recorded 291/9 in a spirited chase of 340 to beat Australia in their Plate semi-final.

Outstanding performances came from E. Morgan (8th overall in the run scorers), K. O'Brien (11th) and W. Porterfield (17th) who all scored in excess of 200 runs during the tournament. On the bowling side, G. Thompson took 12 wickets at 18.16, including 5/49 vs the West Indies, and finished 10th overall in the tournament bowling statistics.

Ireland's performance was splendid and shows great depth in Irish Cricket and a good prospect for the future progression of the game in Ireland.

The Senior Team started their season with their 10th successive win and what an

occasion to celebrate this special achievement. Victory over Surrey in the Cheltenham and Gloucester Trophy was only the second defeat of a county by Ireland in competitive games; the first being against Middlesex in the 1997 Benson and Hedges competition. The Surrey team with 8 Internationals, in fact all six bowlers were Internationals, was a memorable achievement. Surrey batted first and reached 261 all out. Play was interrupted on 4 occasions and Ireland had to wait for the 2nd day to begin the run chase. Andre Botha 3 for 48 and Andrew White 3 for 43 were best of a spirited bowling performance. Our batsmen all contributed. We were given the perfect start by the Captain, Jason Molins, 58 of 57 balls, and Jeremy Bray, 52, who shared in an opening partnership of 103. Andre Botha kept up the momentum with 17 off 22 balls, when Gerald Dros 45 and Peter Gillespie 28 were both out at 223 for 5. Surrey had a slight hope but Andrew White 20 and Kyle McCallan 18 hit the 39 required in 6 overs. Andrew White with his bowling 3 for 43 and batting 20 not out, was awarded 'Man of the Match'. Mark Ramprakash has the dubious honour of being on both the Middlesex and Surrey teams beaten by Ireland.



Our next game against Northants, also at Clontarf, took place at the end of May and was in some ways a mirror image of the Surrey game. There Ireland won the toss and inserted Surrey and their innings was interrupted on a number of occasions. Here Northants won the toss and inserted Ireland and our innings was interrupted on three occasions before we reached 263 for 8. Jeremy Bray 76, Peter Gillespie 66 and Andrew White 44. The one difference between the two matches was that Northants got started on the first day and although it was ten hours after the first ball was bowled before the game finished, they did reach their target in 41.5 overs.

We then moved to Stormont for the two Bank of Ireland games against the West Indies. The Stormont ground continues to improve and in front of a large attendance, with a full Bank of Ireland marquee, Brian Lara entertained us to a sparkling 104 from 99 balls - 4 x 6s and 12 x 4s. West Indies scoring 242 all out. Ireland, after a brisk start, collapsed and were all out for 146.

West Indies made just one change for the second game, Ridley Jacobs, who had played with Eglinton, replacing Baugh. West Indies batted first and scored 292 for 7 in their 50 overs, Dwayne Bravo scoring 100 not out in 66 balls with a six off the last ball of the innings for his 100.

Ireland got off to an excellent start with Bray 71, Molins 66 and then a 5th Wicket partnership of 67 between Niall O'Brien 58 not out and Andy White 32, saw Ireland home for a famous victory. Our thanks to Brian Milford and his committee who, working with the Chief Executive, produced an excellent financial result and a splendid occasion to display Irish Cricket to our Sponsors, Bank of Ireland, BMI, Northern Ireland Events Company, Belfast City Council and Northern Ireland Sports Council, all of whom contributed to staging the event.

The International Cricket Council had set up the Intercontinental Cup, a series of 3day games to be played in four regions with the winners of each region going to Dubai in November for Semi Finals and Final. Ireland, by defeating Denmark in 2003, had joined Holland and Scotland as the European participants. To get used to the format and rules, we arranged a 3-day game against MCC at Limavady which was our next game. This was Ireland's first International at Limavady and the club rightly deserved the praise from all sides for the superb staging of the game.

Ireland batted first with 321 for 7. Jeremy Bray 116, Dom Joyce 56, Andre Botha 41, Trent Johnston 42. MCC replied with 275 all out, two debutants at the opposite end of the age scale, Naseer Shoukat 3 for 46 and Greg Thompson 3 for 87. Ireland declared at 196 for 3 leaving MCC to score 243 in 58 overs. Rain reduced this to 47. In the event, they scored the runs in 43. Asif Mujtaba (Pakistan) not out 117 and M.R. Foster (Victoria) 80 caused the damage but a very useful exercise.

The team then went to Holland to play the first of our Intercontinental games against Holland and then to play the European Championship.

This game had First Class Status. Ireland



won the toss and put Holland in. Holland were all out fro 200. Trent Johnston 4 for 34. Ireland scored 388 for 8 wickets with a magnificent 152 not out by Andrew White.

Holland finished the second day at 0 for 1 and were 119 for 5 at lunch on the last day. Then Shoukat with a devastating spell, took 4 wickets and the last 5 wickets fell for 22 runs. Ireland had won by an innings and 47 runs and as Scotland and Holland had previously drawn their game, Ireland had only to draw with Scotland to reach the Finals in Dubai.

There then followed the European Championships. The first game against ECB XI was rained off and in the resultant bowl out ECB XI won by two strikes to one. Our first game against Holland was also reduced to a 31 over game which Ireland won 181 for 9 v 171 for 8. The second game vs. Scotland, Scotland won the toss and batted, scoring 200 for 6 off their 50 overs. Ireland replied 204 for 5 over 47 overs, which is only our second win in the past sixteen 1-day games against Scotland. Our third game vs. Denmark, Ireland won the toss and batted and scored 265 for 5. Trent Johnston 83, Kyle McCallan 64 not out. Denmark in reply could only muster 156 for 9. White 3 for 34. This ended a very satisfactory visit to Holland, an innings win against Holland in the Intercontinental Cup and three wins in the European Championships to give us No. 1 slot in the 2005 ICC Trophy European Rankings.

There then followed the final game against Scotland in the Intercontinental Cup and this resulted in a very disappointing loss to the Scots.

Scotland won the toss and inserted Ireland who were quickly in trouble, being 76 for 6 at one stage before Shoukat 48, Paul Mooney 32 and Peter Gillespie 44 got us to 193 all out. Scotland also struggled on the Clontarf wicket and were all out for 167, Shoukat 5 for 60. Ireland, in their 2nd innings, were soon in trouble but when Andrew White and Trent Johnston had added 70 for the 6th wicket and we had reached 159 for 5, ahead by 185 with 5 wickets standing, Ireland appeared to have got the upper hand. However, in the event we quickly lost our remaining wickets and were all out for 178, leaving Scotland 205 to win. This they did with a splendid 118 not out by Frazer Watts. Rain was Ireland's only hope on the last day but in the end Scotland were victorious and went on to win the Tournament beating Canada by an innings and establishing themselves as the leading Associate in the world.

Bangladesh were competing in the ICC

Champions Trophy in England, starting early September. They agreed at short notice to come to Ireland and Scotland for two warm-up matches in each country. The Irish players had a busy season and many of our players were involved with promotion and relegation games with their clubs. Because the games were not in the original fixture list, the players were allowed play on the Saturday prior to the first game. This proved a mistake as the Irish never performed to the standard they displayed in the early part of the season.

In the first Gallery Bar International at Stormont, Bangladesh won the toss and put Ireland in to bat. The innings was rain affected and Ireland finished on 179 for 5 in 32 overs. Jason Molins 64. On Duckworth Lewis Bangladesh were set a target of 206 in their 32 overs. They reached their target off the last ball with Nafis Iqbal scoring 100. Our Under 19s had played against Nafis when he scored 80 against our Under 19s in the Semi Final of the Plate.

In the second Gallery Bar International at Limavady, Bangladesh again won the toss but on this occasion decided to bat on a bitterly cold day. At 116 for 6 Ireland appeared in a good position but eventually Bangladesh got to 231 all out with some below par bowling and fielding by Ireland. Gordon Cooke with 5 for 55. When batting, Ireland lost regular wickets and were all out for 177. A disappointing end to the season.

I would like to thank the ICC and ECC for their financial help in staging these games. I would also like to thank Limavady for their contribution.

Some Personal Achievements

On the batting side of those who scored 150+, Andrew White with an average of 48.88 including his 152 not out against Holland topped the list, followed by Trent Johnston on 45, Dom Joyce 45, McCallan, Molins and Bray all averaged 35+.

On the bowling side of those who took 10+ wickets, in first place was Gordon Cooke, with 12 wickets at an average of 18.33 and second was Naseer Shoukat with 19 wickets at an average of 20.26.

with not a ball bowled. This was particularly disappointing as many of our players from Bangladesh Under 19s had no opportunity of showing their abilities.

Our Under 19s with Roy Torrens as Manager and Ray Daly as Coach and Brian Walsh as Assistant Coach, won the Tournament but not in our customary manner. We were beaten by Holland who in turn were beaten by Denmark. So our final game against Scotland was the decider, with Scotland the firm favourites. Ireland batted first and a fine 86 by Captain, Gary Wilson saw us post a very credible 232 for 8. Our bowlers were excellent and had Scotland all out for 75 with Gary Kidd 3 for 9 the pick. With Eoin Morgan at Middlesex and Greg Thompson with the Senior XI, hopefully available this year for the World Cup Qualifier in Scotland, we hope to be one of the two Europeans in Sri Lanka in 2006.

Our Under 17s, with Andy McCrea as Manager and Brían O'Rourke as Coach, were beaten by Scotland and for the second year failed to win at this level. This Tournament was well organised in the North West areas. The team also had availability difficulties.

Under 15s at Herning, Denmark, with Gary Blair as Manager and John Semple as Coach, retained their trophy. On the first day we defeated Holland by 7 runs. On the second day the team had an easy victory over Denmark. On the final day we beat Scotland 189 for 7 played 190 for 6 with 3 balls left. Neil Hamilton was 'Man of the Tournament' with a batting average of 57, 2nd in the overall list, and a bowling average of 9.1 top of the list.

Our Under 13s had a clean sweep in Scotland, winning all three games. The Irish Schools had a 3-day trip playing Cheshire Under 19s at Sale. The first game was unfortunately abandoned after 6 overs. The second game, a 45 over affair, Ireland batted first and got to 139 all out having been 89 for 2. This was disappointing, or as the coach so aptly put in his report, 'undignified'. Conor Geraghty 51 made a top class half century. Cheshire passed the total with just 4 wickets down. T. Barr 2 for 20.

The second game against Yorkshire Schools was played over two days. Ireland elected to bat first and the Captain, Gary Wilson, scored an impressive 115 as Ireland posted 241 for 7. Others to feature were R. Rickman 37 and N. McDarley 32 not out. Yorkshire replaced with 210 for 5. N. McDarley 2 for 49, T. Barr 2 for 70. Ireland then posted 190 for 7 with Robert Rankin 85, Conor Geraghty 32. Yorkshire held on for a draw at 160 for 9. G. Wilson 3 for 20, K. Tonetti 2 for 14 and G. Waterson 2 for 28.



The Irish Women's Senior Team as they prepare to leave for the World Cup in South Africa, had three 1-day games against the World Champions, New Zealand. Each result showed an improvement against a very well organised team. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Bosch for their help in staging these games and for their continued support for Irish Cricket and Women's Cricket in particular.

The Under 21s, with Ursula Lewis as Tournament Director and Eddie Lewis as Tournament Referee, was very well staged in the Dublin areas, with the European Development Manager, Richard Holdsworth, present for the final games and presentation. Ireland's first game vs. Holland was won by 98 runs. Another successful day against the Scots set up the final game against England as the Tournament decider. Ireland batted first and could only muster 119 against a strong English team. This was never going to be sufficient and although we got an early breakthrough, England passed our total without further loss. On a high note, Emma Beamish was named 'Player of the Tournament'.

Interpros and Royal Liver

Interpros: North Leinster with four wins and one no result were easy winners, followed by Northern Cricket Union and North West, both with two wins.

Royal Liver: The Royal Liver returned to the North West with Limavady the comfortable winners. Eglinton, in difficult weather conditions, did an excellent job. Royal Liver, after ten years of sponsorship, has decided not to renew their sponsorship. They were an excellent company to deal with and we thank them for their generous support.

2005 will be a huge year for Irish Cricket. Preparations for the ICC Trophy are well advanced with two committees, one in the North under Richard Johnson and one in the South under Alan Hughes, striving to get all in readiness for July. With the sponsorship of Global Cricket Corporation and no account taken of the difference between an amateur game and a World Cup game, it is proving difficult to get decisions. The event will be launched on 10th March when the format and venues will be announced. The response from the clubs has been excellent and augurs well for the future. Our biggest concern is the difficulty in securing the release of our County players and while we are receiving great support from ICC, we still do not know where we stand. At the end of the day, if the weather is fair I am confident the Union and Irish Cricket will rise to the occasion.

The budget for the Tournament has been greatly reduced and based on dollars certainly has not helped, so if we are to leave a legacy it is going to have to come from internal resources. In this regard I would like to thank the Irish Government for their Grant of €314,000 to 10 clubs for Capital Projects and the Irish Sports Council for an extra €40,000 towards preparing the team. There is a timing difference with the Northern authorities but we are confident of a successful conclusion to our applications for support from Northern sources.

Early March will see a visit by Richard Done, the ICC High Performance Manager. The five teams that qualify for West Indies are eligible for inclusion in High Performance. This has to be a top priority but with our Cheltenham and Gloucester commitments in 2006 will put an extra strain on our players and resources.

I would like to thank the ICC for their continued financial support and to ECC for their help, particularly in staging the Youth Championships and also their Annual Support Grant. We are budgeting grants of €78,000 from these sources for 2005, and this gives an idea of ICC importance to the ICU. The ICC are also contributing €750,000 towards the overall expenses of staging the ICC Trophy.

During the Women's World Cup in South Africa, the amalgamation of ICC and IWCC will take place and this will lead to a more professional running of Women's affairs and I take this opportunity of wising Sandra Dawson, Manager, Peter Johnston, Coach and Claire Shillington and her team every success as the only Associate competing in the World Cup next month.

I am conscious that the Chairman, Hon. Treasurer and Chief Executive are all due to address you this morning and I do not wish to stray into their territories. I would like to mention the Strategic Planning Committee who, under John Caldwell, have started the job of preparing our next five year Strategic Plan. This is a big undertaking and all units of the Union will be involved shortly in consultation in putting this in place, to be launched by the end of 2005.

I would like to put on record our appreciation to the two committees North and South who, working with the Chief Executive, produced two excellent Golf Classics (in the case of the South a wet one) and a substantial profit. Thanks Alfie Linehan and Stan Mitchell for your leadership.

Our continued thanks to our Patrons and hopefully in this special year some more

of our friends will come aboard. Adrian Birrell has the Pathway to the West Indies in place but we do need finance if we are to reach our aims.

ICC are setting up a tier of Elite Umpires for Associates and we wish Trevor Henry, currently in Malaysia, every success.

The ICU will shortly take over the management of the Northern Ireland Cricket Association and we thank our CDOs, North and South, for their strenuous endeavours on our behalf.

We have our three players in Port Elizabeth, Ryan Haire, Kevin O'Brien and William Porterfield and we wish them every success.

On a sad note, we record the death of two very esteemed and well liked Past Presidents, Cecil Cave (1976) and Ian Lewis (1989). Both were highly respected and gave immense service to Irish Cricket . Cecil will be remembered as the President who led the negotiations for our entry to the Gillette Cup, our first competitive competition, while Ian will be remembered for his work in organising supporters' tours to Kenya, Kuala Lumpur and Toronto. Both will be fondly missed.

Today Bob Kerr steps down as our President. Bob was seen throughout the country and performed his duties with great enthusiasm. He is succeed by Stan Mitchell, former International and selector.

My thanks to the Media for all their support throughout the year. My personal thanks to my fellow Officers and Chief Executive for all their help and support.

The announcement in December by ECB that we are invited to participate in a restructured Cheltenham and Gloucester Tournament in 2006, which will involve 9 games was very welcome news and hopefully will be ideal preparation for the West Indies in 2007.

2005, as already stated, will undoubtedly be the biggest year ever for Irish Cricket. The staging of the ICC Trophy 2005 will test our administrators, North and South. The Women's World Cup in South Africa, the Under 19s Qualifying Tournament in Scotland to participate in next year's Under 19 World Cup in Sri Lanka, the visit of Yorkshire for Cheltenham and Gloucester, not to mention the Intercontinental Cup, all adds up to great anticipation and finally, West Indies 2007.
